

WORKSHOP OVERVIEW

The 4-day workshop held on June 25 to 29, 2018, sought to have participants engage, gain, share tools, strategies and best practices with each other to provide solutions and fill in any gaps in their teaching practices. This edition of the collaborative proved the interest and eagerness of faculty from African institutions to come together to build networks, to personally develop their knowledge and skills and to participate in collaborations with Ashesi and each other's

institutions.

This workshop focused on pedagogy with the theme, **Facilitating Inclusive classrooms: Sharing and co-designing practical pedagogy for today's learner.**

THEMATIC-AREAS FOR SESSIONS WERE:

MAKING LEARNING FUN AND RELATABLE: ENGAGING LEARNERS WITH DIVERSE LEARNING STYLES AND NEEDS.

FACILITATED SESSIONS

MAKING LEARNING RELATABLE

 *Considering the diversity in education background, culture, and learning styles, How Might We design content and use pedagogy that will help the student relate and connect during the learning process?*

Case: Giving Voice to Values: Enablers & Disablers

Facilitators: David A. Sampah, and Diane Davis, Ashesi university, Ghana

Abstract: Students come into college from a heterogenous background in religion, culture, education and skills. This makes the playing field uneven especially for college starters. Using activities, a case and round table discussions, this session will share the design, tools, and implementation of a program to help freshmen settle into college life for success. The tools, lessons and successes of the Ashesi Success program will be shared in this session.

Case: Facilitating Learning for Both English Proficient Learners and English Language Learners (ELL)

Facilitator: Shana-Michelle Rabonda, ALU, Mauritius

Abstract: African Leadership College (ALU) is an English-medium institution, but with less than half of Africa's countries being anglophone, a percentage of our student body are not English language speakers. This topic will provide insight into our practice at ALU to support English Language Learners (ELLs) in their learning journey. Shana will provide insight into how ALU prepares ELLs for learning at ALU, how ALU's teaching practices cater for them, as well as what continued support exists throughout their academic experience in college.

PROGRAM OVERVIEW & SESSIONS

Case: How to Make Teaching and Learning Transformational for Both the Teacher and Student

Facilitator: Dr. Esi Ansah, Ashesi University, Ghana

Abstract: Schooling is supposed to confer certificates to the 'schooled', and Education is supposed to equip the educated with tools to transform self and others – ideally, self, family, community and nation. How does one do this in the context of classroom learning? How do we model and teach application of what students learn in class to real life situations – not because there is a grade to be earned, but because they find it useful and can make it applicable? This workshop will explore authentic connections with students, and how to challenge them to make their own learning relevant and transformative.



CONNECTING WITH A TECH-SAVVY GENERATION

MAKING LEARNING RELEVANT AND CURRENT

The internet is accessible, technology is fast changing, and the college student's attention is split in several ways. Technology cannot be ignored in the rethinking pedagogy for formal education today. This theme will explore how collaborators are using current media and accessible technology in teaching and learning in their unique contexts.

Case: Using Self-Paced and Independent Pathways to Support Students with Different Needs

Facilitator: Landry Sugira, Kepler University, Rwanda

Abstract: Students at Kepler Kiziba learn through a phased model. They move at their own pace and use independent learning pathways to improve their writing, reading, and math skills. The session will cover how that process looks like, how facilitators support students working on pathways, as well as tools and strategies that are used to make this process effective.

Case: Engaging Students Through Media: Teaching Truth & Tolerance in The Digital Classroom

Facilitator: Kobina Ankomah-Graham, Ashesi University, Ghana

Abstract: In this session, we will share experiences of using digital and social media tools (e.g. Whatsapp, Twitter, blogs & podcasts) in the classroom to explore how technology and media can be used to teach inclusion, tolerance and open-mindedness in the face of polarization and a world awash with 'alternative facts'.

Case: Facilitating A Large Class Size Of 250 Students


Facilitator: Benjamin Amoako Amanquah, Accra Technical University




WORKSHOP EVALUATION
