


Some impromptu comments from students






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Maybe not




"Except for an extraordinary diligence in looking out for his personal advancement, he had no motives at all. And this diligence in itself was in no way criminal; he certainly would never have murdered his superior in order to inherit his post. He merely, to put the matter colloquially, never realized what he was doing. It was precisely this lack of imagination which enabled him to sit for months on end facing a German Jew who was conducting the police interrogation, pouring out his heart to the man and explaining again and again how it was that he reached only the rank of lieutenant colonel in the S.S. and that it had not been his fault that he was not promoted. In principle he knew quite well what it was all about, and in his final statement to the court he spoke of the 'revaluation of values prescribed by the [Nazi] government.' He was not stupid. It was sheer thoughtlessness – something by no means identical with stupidity - that predisposed him to become one of the greatest criminals of that period."


What is ethics if not the ability to see what is right in front of us and to act in accordance with a proper understanding of what is the case, to dispel illusion and avoid falsity? Ethical living must then be a condition for the desirable life insofar as none of us explicitly wishes to live as deluded fools, that is, as slaves of illusions. We want to be in the driver's seat of our lives, acting in accordance with our best understandings of what is the case. In other words, we want to be free agents, active in the fullest sense. This is the task of a lifetime, continuous with personal growth. – Pedro Tabensky

Impulses and desires that are not ordered by intelligence are under the control of accidental circumstances. It may be a loss rather than a gain to escape from the control of another person only to find one's conduct dictated by immediate whim and caprice; that is, at the mercy of impulses into whose formation intelligent judgment has not entered.
